2013-2014 SCHOOL PROFILE

CLEAR CREEK INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT is one of the highest performing large school districts in the state of Texas. All schools have exceeded the State's standard in all the areas of Texas accountability system. The district encompasses an area of 103 square miles in southern Harris County and northern Galveston County. CCISD serves a diverse population of more than 217,000 citizens. CCISD also includes 44 modern neighborhood schools with an approximate student enrollment of 39,600.

CLEAR LAKE HIGH SCHOOL is consistently one of the top rated schools in Texas and in the United States. In 2013, the campus earned all three distinctions from the Texas Education Agency: Top 25% Progress, Academic Achievement in Reading/ELA, and Academic Achievement in Mathematics. Coming in at No. 392, Clear Lake High School is once again ranked by Newsweek magazine as one of America's Best High Schools. U.S. News and World Report also recognized CLHS, ranking it at No. 643 in the United States. CLHS also received the College Readiness Award" from the Texas ACT Council. Clear Lake is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. As of September 5, 2013, there are 2416 students enrolled: 520 seniors; 611 juniors; 634 sophomores; 651 freshmen. The student body is composed of students from all parts of the United States and many foreign countries. Our ethnic diversity is 53.97% Caucasian; 20.13% Hispanic; 15.77% Asian; 6.22% African American; 0.33% American Indian; 0.16% Pacific Islander; 3.42% reporting two or more races. CLHS is located one mile from NASA's Johnson Space Center. Major contributors to our local economy are aerospace corporations that serve NASA, the petrochemical industry, tourism, recreational boating, and the many businesses which serve a diverse suburban population. Approximately 61% of our graduates go on to 4 year institutions, 32.5% go on to 2 year institutions, 2.1% go on to the military, and 4.4% go on to work, technical school or other.

CURRICULUM consists of 436 courses for students to choose to prepare themselves for college, university, technical school or a career. Courses are offered at a regular level of study as well as an advanced level. Regular courses are the courses in which the greatest portion of the student body enrolls. Advanced Academic, Pre-Advanced Placement, and Advanced Placement courses are advanced level classes that provide students with more concentrated study in a particular field.
